The county of Leitrim is likely to acquire a high character for sheep feeding, owing to the enterprise of Francis Cullen, Esq. and Col White. The former has four thousand sheep feeding upon the mountains hitherto regarded as worthless. The sheep are small Scotch, and thrive admirably. Col White is pursuing a similar system.

The Blarney steamer from London has arrived at Valencia with machinery and gear for the peat manufacture, under the superintendence of Mr Hays, CE, near Caherciveen.

At Tuam the market commissioners ascertained the tolls and customs are rented from Colonel Knox, proprietor of the town, at £80 a year. There is no toll board or record made of produce weighed, no sworn weighmaster, no weight unless 7lbs for corn, and 14 lbs is deducted for sacks.

Patrick and Margaret Smith, brother and sister, aged respectively 70 years, were murdered last night upon their farm near Swords, by persons as yet unknown.

At the City Police Court this day, 15 prisoners were brought up. Michael Hinchy was fined 5s or a week's imprisonment for being drunk and annoying the congregation at Bedford-row; Edmond Callinan, drunk and assaulting Head Constable Joynt, same rule; Denis Donovan, rioting in the streets, 10 days in gaol. Informations were ordered against Anne Connors, stealing cloaks from the establishment of Arnott & Co George's-st; Edmond Ryan, Michal Keays, and William Horty were fined 1s each for not having the names marked on their cars; Francis and Mary Dacey, rioting in the streets, same fine; Mary Roche was fined 10s or 21 days' imprisonment, for breaking glass in the shop window of Mr Blundell.

This day a soldier of the 31st, who remained sick in garrison upon the departure of the Regiment, was interred with military honors by the 14th Regt.
