THE LATE REV. GODFREY MASSY.

THE LATE RRY, GODFREY MASSY,

For many years past an event has occurred in the County or City of Limerick which has counted such the Protestant community as the denies of this faithful and scalous minister of the Gospel. We may safely say it is regarded not only as a public calamity but as a domestic visitation, depriving the widow and orphas of their best earthly friend and sathening every family by the loss of a beloved brother; affletion pervades every rank and popularates to every heart the brow of the aged is clouded with grief, and siniles have been succeeded by tears on the face of youth. The family is of high antiquity, and traces is descent from Roilo, the great Chieftain of Normandy in the 10th century. His igreat great grandfather, Hugh (whose brother Charles was Dean of Elizabeth, 4th sister of the first Lord Carbory, and had issue seven sons, of whom the elicust became first Lord Massy, the sixth, first Lord Carbory, and had issue seven sons, of whom the Rev Codfrey Massy, of Bruff. He had intended mearly life to cure the medical profession, but in consequence of the excellent teaching of a pious and exemplary mother was led to embrace with all his heart the sacred ministry of the Gospel. He was accordingly ordained Deacon by the late Bishop of Limerick, Dr Jebb, on the 17th Dec. 1826, and his first Curacy was that of Fedamore, in which he was no soone installed than he commenced his career of usefulness, by erecting, at Minister of the Church, without such a medium for training the rising generation, is devoid of the most important requisite, and therefore he did not hesisted to sacrifice his own interest on the altar of God.—
His insisterial labors were abundantly blessed, and his james is held in the deepost reverence there till the present day. When it pieased the Lord to call him to another sphere of duty, his farewell sermon was attended by all the parishioners, and the small church was so crowded that many occupied the communion rails. Soon, however, he found out the people at their homes; his exhortations and Christian apirit won them over, and the church was gradually filled. The work of God went on prosperously till the building was insufficient to contain the congregation. Previously to his seizure by the fatal complaint which eventuated in his ideath he had planned and made some provision for the building of a new church on a enlarged scale with the assistance of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, but his continued liness impaded its execution, and the edifice, now old and greatly dissiplated, creamins for some worthy successor to raze to the ground, and erect in its place a structure adequate to the wants of the parish. There is no doubt but this good work will be effected. All the preliminary arrangements have been made, and the present Earl of Limerick has kindly granted a site, so that little will remain for the new Incumbent but to tread in the stops of his predecessor; and carry out his views. During Mr Massy's residence in Bruff, altogether 21 years, he was indefatigable in the discharge of his duty, both in public and private. By permission of successive High Sheriff, the school had been for many years held in the session house, but one High Sheriff, a Roman Catholia, refused his sanction to this custom, and the children were driven out to seek an asylum in some cabine rented by Mr Massy for the purpose. This act of intolerance was productive of the greatest good, the spirit of the Protestant gentry was roused, and they contributed liberally towards a new building. A site was granted by the late Lord Carbery, and the school house quickly rose in fair and beautiful proportions. It is a hand-aome and commodious building containing suitable apartments for teachers, with a school room, capable of containing three hundred pupils. Every cohvenience is connected with it, and the front presents a pleasure ground tastefully laid out and enclosed by a low wall with handsome iron railing. Here for many years past have been held the sanual meetings of the Protestant Orphan Society for Bruff branch, and frequently have we seen it crowded to excess, while the tried advocates of the society have dilated on its blessings and benefits. SUBMARINE PETARD, OR CATAMARAN PERCUSSION SHELL.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE MINKERS CHROSTELE.

Victoria Hold, Cork, 19th Oct.

SIE—Yesterday, at Haulbowline; I successfully tested this shell after the following manner:—The shell was formed of wrought iron, being three inches long, and three inches in diameter; it was drilled an inch and half deep, the diameter of the bore being one inch, leaving the shell an inch Linet. Taigraph it with the Cartachum of (lumading) prodef, and stopped it with a cork fisting close. In the centre of this cork was a perforation to adout the military percussion cap, a tin tube, two inches long, charged with fulminating mercury, and having a percussion cap on each end passed through the cork level with it, the cork projecting about the third of an inch. The shell was then, put into the spous and I let go the cord, when the shell exploded on the plank, crashing it into something like a pulp, and bursting in two parts. The effect of such a shell on a ship would so be to set her on fire, but would make a breach in her as if she had struck on a sunken rock, obliging the invaders to take to their boats and swimming juckets.
