DEATH OF JAMES M'CARTHY, ESQ.

*From the New Orleanian of Tuesday, Oct, 19th.*  
Yesterday afternoon, died Mr James M'Carthy, for-  
merly proprietor of the *Limerick and Clare Examiner*.  
For a few days the deceased had been ailing; on Saturday  
he was abroad—on Sunday confined to his bed—on Mon-  
day dead—on Tuesday buried! And this is life's brief  
detail, it is the concise history of numbers; to-day, well  
—tomorrow ill—the next day, perhaps, and the throbb-  
ing heart has ceased its myatic beatings: the eye is  
closed hermetically in death—the tongue is silent for  
ever—and an inanimate form, which, but a day or two  
previous, was replete with life and vigour, extends  
itself in flinty rigidness, before some anguish stricken  
little family group, immediate relatives or endeared  
friends, who would give worlds to hear again that stilled  
tongue's utterance—to have the death-filmed eyes look  
kindly on them once more. The deceased had been  
amongst us but some twelve months; but his affa-  
bility, his kind and social manners, made him known  
to and recommended him to several. He was of  
generous, easy, and kindly nature—a type of the  
many common to his native land in our boyhood's  
time. His expressive countenance and handsome fea-  
tures spoke his character as truthfully as though it were  
legibly printed in letter-press form on "the human face,  
divine." Encased beneath its broad covering, beat as  
guileless a heart, in the bosom of James M'Carthy, as  
that which heaven bestows on infancy. To him the para-  
dise of earth seemed to be the social circle—the com-  
mingling of kindred spirits, home associations and happy  
converse. A large and helpless family, amongst strangers,  
in a land wholly new to them—hardly capable, any one  
of them, save his afflicted wife, of fully appreciating his  
or her loss—petrified, as it were, yesterday gathered  
around the lifeless corse of him to whom they looked  
up for bread! A little tiny thing, with eyes reddened  
by weeping, from witnessing others weep, gazed in-  
tently on the face of her defunct father, anti-  
cipating, seemingly, every moment a recognising  
glance from him who lay before her so calm, so still,  
so strangely mute, from what she had ever known;  
for it was his wont, daily and hourly, to look lovingly  
on, to playfully caress and press her to his manly  
bosom! God pity the bereaved! Heaven be mer-  
ciful to the departed! We cannot avoid adding  
that a purer spirit, a nobler or braver Irishman,  
a more genial and generous friend, never de-  
parted from the circle of his friends and asso-  
ciates. We believed with the intensity of faith that  
James M'Carthy would live a long, useful and distin-  
guished life in the land of liberty about which he was  
so enthusiastic. But God in his mercy has otherwise  
arranged it. Most sincerely do we condole with his  
faithful wife and orphaned family.
