The chairman drew up resolutions commending Mr. Michael Moore, who has been relieving officer in this union, and who frequently acted as clerk in the absence of his brother, as a person fully qualified for the situation of Clerk to Listowel union. Mr Stephen Donegan was on Monday elected house surgeon to the North Infirmary, Cork, and in consequence Mr Burke, the Treasurer, resigned immediately after, because the acting surgeon, Mr Shinkwin, had not been appointed.

In the case of Wynne v Longfield, to compel the execution of a proposal to purchase the interest of a house in Merrion square, Dublin, for £450, the Lord Chancellor has decided for defendant who disposed of it to Sir David Roche, for £500, in the interval of plaintiff delaying to complete his proposal by the specified time.

In Hollier v Hedges, to obtain interest arrears on foot of annuities, to the amount of £41,705, granted on loan of £9000 and £1000, borrowed by late R Hedges Eyre, the Court of Chancery has granted interest on the latter sum, the interest of 11 per cent. on the former being quite ample compensation, without interest on arrears.

At the Fair of Limerick, held at Singland on Monday, there was but a poor supply of stock, and little business done. Beef rated at from 39s to 40s per cwt; in calf heifers sold at from £9 to £11 each; mutton 5d per lb sink; bacon pigs in request, at from 39s to 41s per cwt.

At the fair of Dromin yesterday the price of beef varied from 36s to 43s per cwt. Mr O'Donnell of Kilmallock sold a prime heifer for £22.

At the fairs of Tipperary and Croom, a correspondent informs us that beef rated in Tipperary at 35s to 40s per cwt; store strippers went so high as 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ 10s each. At Croom fair beef rated from 34s to 40s per cwt; mutton was in no demand; young cattle were dear. Sales at Croom—James D Lyons, 14 cows at 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ 5s each; Pat Coll, 16 at 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ 10s; John Hartigan 12 at 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ each; Wm Bennett 10 at 11 $\frac{1}{2}$.
