The inhabitants of Newcastle suffer much incon-
venience, having no magistrate resident in the town
or neighbourhood. Parties arrested for the most
trivial offences are necessarily taken to the
resident magistrate of Abbeyfeale, a distance of
about ten Irish miles, and parties are frequently
confined in Newcastle bridewell 7 days by not having a
magistrate in the town to receive bail. If the nutho-
rities acted fairly towards the people of this locality
they would appoint a resident magistrate, or give the
commission of the peace to some respectable inhabitant
of the town of Newcastle or neighbourhood.

Constable Kennet, an active and efficient officer,
has been changed from Staffordstown, county Antrim,
to Ballyclare, and is replaced by Constable Lamb, of
Ballyclare, who was lately presented with a gold
watch by the inhabitants of that station, also with a
badge of merit by the Inspector General, for his
unceasing exertions in bringing offenders to justice.

On the complaint of the Constabulary against a
publican named John Brady, of Staffordstown, county
Antrim, for entertaining illegal assemblies in his
house, his license has been withdrawn by order of the
Lord Lieutenant. The Constabulary have also been
directed to prosecute Brady for obtaining his license
fraudulently.

The Kingston and Holyhead steamers, Anglia and
Scotia, have got up deck saloons, which are a great
comfort to the passengers.

A labourer named Michael Heaghy, employed at
Peafield mills, near Ballysimon, was accidentally
killed on Sunday night, having fallen between the sluice
and water wheel.

The Australian agricultural shares rose from £100
to £205 on Saturday in the London market; £15 is
only paid.

A shipwreck occurred at Yokane, near Castletown-
send, on Saturday night last. The ship *Isabella
Barnes*, from Port Wallace, North America, 700
tons burden, laden with timber and deals, bound to
Hull, owned by Carr & Co., Thomas Barclay master,
was driven on the rocks at Yokane, county Cork, and
went to pieces. The carpenter was standing on the
deals, which, when separated, he fell between, and was
bruised to atoms; the rest of the crew escaped on the
rock she struck on. A passenger from America, going
to Australia, lost 300 sovereigns he had in a bag. A
large quantity of the timber was driven on the shore,
which is protected by the Police and Coast Guard.
Nothing but a dog was saved from on board—clothes
and all lost. It is feared the vessel was not insured.
