Yesterday morning, at 6 o'clock, the remains of  
the late Mrs Mathew O'Brien, formerly of Newcastle,  
near this city, left by train for Dublin, accompanied  
by her sons-in-law, the Rev. George Massy and Mr  
Goold, in order to interment at Cheltenham, beside  
the remains of her beloved husband. Her son in law,  
Mr Richardson, who came over to Limerick from  
London, to attend the funeral obsequies, was unable  
to proceed with the remains, having taken ill, and  
remains indisposed at Cruise's hotel.

It is surprising that the tenants of Wyndham

ances to his tenantry for improvements of every kind,  
such as ditching, draining, and building, and has  
very lately intersected his property with well laid out  
and nicely finished roads, the result of which is, that  
Mr Goold's tenants at fair and market, have a degree  
of comfort about them not found on other estates.
