William Monsell, Esq. is appointed Clerk of the Ordnance in room of Major Dunne, MP. The acceptance of this office, hitherto always filled by a military gentleman, has made it necessary for Mr. Monsell to vacate his seat for the county of Limerick. The writ of election was issued on Wednesday last, by the Speaker, and was this day delivered to the High Sheriff, who has fixed Wednesday, 12th inst. for the election.

Mr Monsell is the first Roman Catholic Clerk of the Ordnance, since the Revolution of 1688. The salary is £1200 a year beside patronage. Mr Monsell has arrived at Tervoe house from London.

Robert Potter, Esq. MP, arrived in Limerick last night by train from Dublin.

Yesterday morning, Constable Nash, of George's-quay station, had conveyed to Barrington's hospital an elderly female, named Mary Galern, who, it was reported, had died from injuries said to have been inflicted by Ellen and Catherine Gleeson, in a frivolous quarrel which took place between the parties in Mary-street, respecting the prostration of the large chimney flue at Mr Russell's flax factory, during the recent storm, deceased having expressed regret that such a good firm should have sustained loss. The accused are in custody, pending a Coroner's inquest.

An old man named Edward Hayes, when crossing George's-street yesterday, was run over by a merchant's dray, and had his thigh broken.
