The Major was not a little surprised at finding the robber's garb instead of his own on the following morning. Constable Nash, of this City, having been called upon, is on the look-out for the burglars, and discovered some pawn-tickets which they left behind at Fort Fergus, calculated to lead to the apprehension of the offenders.

A woman who emigrated off the estate of Lord Clonbrock, remitted, through his lordship, £75 for her husband and relatives, and shortly afterwards forwarded £100 to enable all her family to join her. In her letter to his lordship she states that she is worth £8,000.

Wednesday night, a poor man of the name of Marsh, a labourer in the employ of Mr M'Donald, a Scotch Roman Catholic gentleman, who lately purchased the demesne of Castle Daly in the Incumbered estates court, was fired at in his own house, near Moate, but fortunately escaped with a slight wound in the thigh, a quantity of slugs being lodged in the wall beside him.

On Thursday evening, on the high road to Moate, within hearing of the railway station, Thomas Kerry was brutally attacked by four men with bludgeons, who, having fractured his skull, left him apparently dead. After some time the poor man was able to crawl to the house of Mr Sills, an Englishman, his employer, where he was attended with the greatest humanity, and received immediate medical assistance. He was barely able to say that he knew the men who assaulted him. Before he could declare their names he expired on Friday morning.
