At a meeting of the Newcastle board of guardians Wednesday, Edward Curling, Esq. V.C. presiding, the following was the state of the house:—Remaining close of last week, 2,146; admitted, 125; total, 2,271; discharged, 93; died, 2; remaining on last Saturday, 2,176; cost of in-door relief, £115 4s 6d; general average cost, 1s 0½d; number on out-door relief, 662; cost of out-door relief, £17 5s 1d; lodged during week, £312 4s 10d; paid, £318 8s 6d; balance in favor of guardians, £2,422 10s 6d. Mr. Curling moved that the union be divided into five districts for the collection of the forthcoming rate, and that collectors be advertised for, the guardians not binding themselves to accept the lowest tender. Mr. Walker proposed an amendment, that there be six districts, but on a poll being taken the resolution was declared carried, it being deemed the most judicious and beneficial to the union. John Green was declared contractor for sinking a pump in the workhouse yard, at 6s per foot, through clay.

Number of paupers in Ennis workhouse 2,300. In bank to credit of union £43, reserved for annuities £2,100. Michael Considine is appointed master of the Turnpike auxiliary, and Teresa Holmes, matron, of the sheds attached to Rathkeale workhouse were partially damaged by fire on Thursday morning.

The Killarney board of guardians have, on motion of Mr. Gallwey, Lord Kenmare's agent, rescinded the resolution hostile to the principle of the guarantee, extended to the Tralee and Killarney railway.

The Cork guardians have advertised for tenders for the emigration of 210 girls from the workhouse to St. John's and St. Andrew's, in batches of 50.

Mr. Kenny White, of Waterford, slipped and fell on the frosty pave, by which his arm was broken.
