The Canada Clergy reserves bill was read a second time by a majority of 83 for Government.

Mr Fitzgerald's motion for copy of the warrant appointing Mr Kemmis, Crown Solicitor of the Leinster Circuit, was agreed on Thursday.

The Waterford county election committee refused to open the question of registry, and Mr Hutchison therefore abandoned the petition. Mr Esmonde is declared duly elected.

The 71st, under Lt. Col. Denny, sailed this morning from Cork in the Emerald Isle, for Corfu.

The 89th from Buttevant, arrived at Cork yesterday. John W. Mahony, Esq. was this day appointed Treasurer to the County Limerick Infirmary, in room of Thomas Gabbett, Esq. resigned.

O'Gorman Mahon had an interview with Lord Palmerston this day, relative to the Ennis petition.

The sale of Sunville, in this county, was yesterday opened in the Encumbered Estates Court, by Mr Sayers lodging 500L. and the Court have ordered a re-sale in April next.

Patrick Coghlan was fined £20, or three months imprisonment, at Waterford assizes, for the abduction of a voter. Denis Brien, taken up in this City, was sentenced to 7 years transportation, for robbing the governor of Waterford gaol.

A case which we trust will prove important and highly salutary in its results has just been tried at our assizes. A quack doctor and barber, named Groves, was indicted for the manslaughter of John Ryan by having administered to him a quantity of violent medicine which resulted in Ryan's death. After a patient investigation the Jury found the prisoner guilty. The principal medical evidence was that of Dr Parker, which was so clear and satisfactory to the Court, whilst (to use the language of the learned judge who tried the case,) at same time "so frank," as to bring conviction to all who heard it.

The Court adjourned at 6 o'clock to Monday.
