Grand Jury will be sworn at Nenagh on Mon-
day for fiscal business, and the commission will
be held by Mr. Sergeant Howley the following day.
John Shanahan was fined 20s at Nenagh this
morning for assault on the police, and Thomas Ryan 10s.
The townspeople of Galway, at a public meeting,
held by Peter Daly in the chair, have passed the
needed improvement bill, and referred it to
the Government for the sanction of Parliament. The
Commissioners are to be elected annually at the Poor
Law Guardians, and that within a mile and half from
St. Nicholas's Church, the taxation should be 1s in the
pound, and beyond those limits 6s in the pound, for
the remainder of the borough, the qualification, a
year, on the basis of the Poor law valuation,
Commissioners, and £8 a year for electors. Mr.
Daly moved as an amendment, that the area of
the town subject to 1s in the pound be extended from
one and half to two miles, which was agreed to.
The old houses in the town of Galway are pre-
sented as nuisances by the Grand Jury.

In consequence of Mr Blakeney's appointment to the
office of Crown solicitor for the county of Galway, he
has resigned the secretaryship of the town grand jury, and
Robert Stephens was elected his successor.

For the year a barony cess collector for the county of
Down had collected a large sum of money from
the ratepayers, but forgot to credit the parties, and so
appeared to be a large arrear; but the rate was
not assessed, demanded, and distress threatened. The
case came before the grand jurors of the
county, when it was decided that as people who paid
the rate should not be compelled to pay a second time, the sure-
ties of the deceased collector should be sued for the
amount due by him to the treasurer, and a new collec-
tor appointed in the person of Russell Mulcahy Esq. appointed.
John Blackett, Esq. Greenhills, Moneygall, is
appointed a magistrate of the King's county.
John Sugrue, Esq. of Fermoy, is appointed a
magistrate for Kerry.

William D Griffith, Esq. Danmore, is appointed
a justice of the peace for Galway county.
