The senior Lieutenants of the five Regiments of Cavalry and the second senior Lieutenants of the twenty four Regiments of Infantry, serving in the East Indies, are each promoted to the regimental rank of Captain.

Margaret Halloran, wife of Patrick Halloran, of Clarina, smith and farrier, and a pensioner from the 6th Carbineers, who was admitted into Barrington's Hospital, last December, in a dangerous state, from wounds inflicted with a sword by her husband (as detailed in *Chronicle* at the time of the occurrence) died in that institution yesterday. This afternoon, Thos Costelloe, Esq. Coroner, held an Inquest on the body, when circumstantial evidence was adduced showing that Halloran and his wife were intoxicated on the night she sustained the injuries, and the testimony of Surgeon Gore was that she died from hectic fever, induced by a long continued discharge from wounds inflicted on the right leg by some sharp instrument, her constitution being in a shattered state. The jury returned a verdict of manslaughter against the husband.

Judge Crumpton, at Kilkenny assizes, said he found on the calendar several prisoners committed by Magistrates, some until they could find bail, which was in fact a sentence of perpetual imprisonment; and others for a year, if they did not find bail, which was nearly as bad. This was a most illegal proceeding, as magistrates ought only to commit prisoners to be brought before the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, or for some time to be detained according to law. He should order all those prisoners to be discharged.
