

The destination of the 34th is to return from the West Indies to Canada. The 34th is to return from the West Indies without being relieved, and the 41st is to remain at Gibraltar instead of proceeding to Canada.

Serjeant Major King, serjeants Byrnes and O'Neill, and Privates Byrnes and Woolf, 3d Light Dragoons, received the Punjab medal last week at Maidstone.

There are 177 cadets at the Royal Military College Sandhurst, of which 107 are sons of civilians, 49 sons of officers in the army, and 1 orphan of an officer in the navy. The amount paid to the establishment last year was £17,566 by the gentleman cadets, and £164 by the officers of the senior department. Last year the total cost of the establishment was £16,486.

The Commander in Chief in India has been pleased to promote Lt Col Henry R Milner, 94th to be Colonel by Brevet, in the East Indies, 27th Oct, 1852.

Lieut. the Hon. Lucius Cary, 27th, is to proceed to India as Aide de Camp to his father, Viscount Falkland, Governor of Bombay.

Col. Sir H M Wheeler, K C B, will be appointed to command the Lahore division, in consequence of Brigadier General Yates being unable to avail himself of his nomination. Col. Wheeler was on the eve of proceeding home.

The horses of the 3d Light Dragoons have been sent on to Lahore, after the officers and men had embarked at Kurrachee for England last January.

Lieut. Peel, 53d, is appointed Paymaster, in succession to Paymaster Hall, retired.

Paymaster Evans, 78th, is about to retire on half-pay, and Quartermaster Webster succeeds him.

Major General Sir Robert Nickle, who was on board the steam ship *Australian* (which broke down) for passage to that colony to command the troops, will re-embark with his staff in the *Argo* steamer.

Side-arm sheds are to be constructed at Camden and Carlisle Forts. Pivots and racers are to be placed for mounting guns on the Fortress at Spike Island.

Lieut Vials, 95th, is appointed to the Leeds recruiting station, vice Young, 80th, promoted to a company.

The 7th Hussars have transferred their recruiting party from Aberdeen, for want of success, to Belfast.

The recruiting party of the 28th at Mullingar is ordered to join at Newcastle upon Tyne, the Regt. being complete.

Capt M'Carthy, R.M., has arrived at Bath to recruit for the Royal Marines; Capt Welsh, R.M., at Taunton and Capt Penrose, R.M., at Birmingham on the same day. There are now 39 officers detached to recruit for the Marines.

We are persuaded that the authorities at the Horse Guards are in ignorance the miserable condition of the military in Australia, who cannot possibly endure the deprivation of necessary food with any regard to discipline and physical efficiency, under recent circumstances in that colony.

At Melbourne the military are charged 2s a pint for milk.

The privates of the 99th at Hobart Town, Van Dieman's Land, are starving upon their short rations, 2lb. loaf between six, the local provision market having become exorbitantly high.

There have been very elegant and commodious barracks (of iron) erected at Melbourne. We have seen a remarkably nice sketch of them drawn by an officer of the 11th stationed there, and sent to his friends in Limerick.

Desertions have taken place amongst the troops at Melbourne, and a reward is offered of 25/ for the apprehension of each deserter. The 11th and 40th are stationed there.

Lieut Rawlings, of the Portsmouth Marines, has been summoned for not obeying the order of the court in not liquidating his debts. It appeared he had incurred debts amounting to £300, under the expectation that when of age he should be possessed of 3000/ but the money had been spent by his grandfather. He consented to appropriate one fourth of his pay.
