The prisoners were then arraigned, and the following pleaded guilty:—Anne Neil, larceny of potatoes, one week's imprisonment; James M'Mahon, an old offender, robbery, 7 years transportation; James M'Namara, burglary at Ballylin, 7 years transportation; John Keating, Patt Quinlivan, Wm Madigan, James Gleeson, for setting fire to and burning the workhouse sheds at Rathkeale, each 10 years transportation; Mary Wall, an old offender, larceny, 7 years transportation; Anty Connors and Margaret Kiely, larceny from Newcastle workhouse, 3 months at hard labour; Wm Clanchy and Wm Carroll, being of the party who set fire to the sheds at Rathkeale, and who gave first information, 3 months and 3 whippings; John Kiely, larceny of workhouse clothing, do; there were only 65 entries of processes at Newcastle sessions, and only 90 at Rathkeale.

A novel case came before the court on Thursday, in which Mr Molony, of Charleville, was plaintiff, and Rev Maurice Ahern, PP Castlemahon, defendant. It was an action for £8 18s 6d for diet and lodging of defendant when at school at Charleville in the year 1821. Rev Mr Ahern was examined, and after hearing his evidence his worship severely censured the party bringing such a case before him, which was dismissed on the merits.

It blew a gale of wind on Thursday night, and the London morning mails were late in Dublin and Limerick.

DEATHS BY DROWNING.—By the smack *Fanny*, Mestell master, arrived yesterday, we have received the following melancholy intelligence:—"Last evening Thursday, while at anchor near Askeaton, between 8 and 9 o'clock, hearing screams in the water, put out a small boat, and picked up Captain Martinovich of the ship *Pannonia*, from Odessa; he was holding on by the keel of a jolly boat, bottom uppermost; brought him to his ship—he states that Capt Cernigorevich of the ship *Ralli*, of Kerna, Capt Sevelich, of the ship *Caledonia*, of Berdianskia, with four sailors, were drowned by the upset of the jolly boat in a squall, when proceeding from Askeaton to their ships."

Further Particulars.
A truly melancholy accident occurred on Thursday evening during the storm, and which unfortunately resulted in a great sacrifice of human life. It appears that the Captains of three Austrian vessels now delivering grain cargoes off Askeaton to Messrs J. N. Russell & Sons, and anchored in the Shannon, about 18 miles below this City, went on shore to make some marketing purchases in that town, and were returning together in one boat with a crew of six hands, and under sail, when a squall caught her about 8 o'clock in the evening, and upset the boat. The cries of distress were first heard by the master of the *Fanny*, one of Messrs Russell's schooners employed in lightening the cargoes of those vessels, and he, in the most praiseworthy manner, at great personal risk put out his little boat and proceeded in direction of the cries, and at length came up to a boat, bottom up, and in it found one man who appears to be the captain of the *Pannonia*, but he was in so insensible a state that until this day no information could be got.—Sad to relate he now confirms the fears entertained, that the Captains of the "*Ralli* and *Caledonia*" were in her, and lost with the boats crew. Every exertion is making by the Messrs. Russell, and the Austrian Consul, M R Ryan, Esq. to find the bodies and protect the property of these poor men, and the vessels are delivered up to the Consulate, where the national standard of that country floats half mast high, and all the vessels in port have paid a similar respect, by having their flags lowered.

In the storm on Thursday night, a lighter engaged in unloading foreign bread stuff vessels at Grass Island was swamped; but no lives were lost.

The *Minerva* steamer, from Liverpool and Belfast, run down a schooner unknown, off the Calf of Man on Tuesday night, when the unfortunate vessel sunk immediately with all hands, no effort being made to avoid the collision or save the drowning persons, according to a passenger on board the steamer. Captain Lyall, of the *Minerva*, is held to bail in £200 by the Belfast magistrates to attend when called upon. The *Minerva*, it is stated, run down another vessel before this.

The *Lady Russell* sailed from Tralee this morning with 350 emigrants for New York.

Four young urchins for assaulting the wardmaster in the parent workhouse were committed to gaol on Thursday for two months.

The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.
