#### DEATH OF JAMES ROCHE, Esq.

We record with regret the death of one of our most distinguished citizens, and as remarkable a man as almost any now in existence. At an early age this morning James Roche breathed his last. His death was unexpected but not premature; for he had outlived the ordinary span of human life, having reached his 83d year. Up to the very last moment of his life this singularly endowed man remained in the fullest possession of faculties which age seemed rather to invigorate than weaken. As active in body as in mind, he was unremitting in the discharge of his duties: and no later than last week he presided at a meeting of the governors of the Eglinton lunatic asylum, when he displayed all the vigilance and readiness which could be expected from a person in the prime of life. And as an instance of his wonderful mental activity, it is only necessary to refer to a work of research and ability which he published 2 years since "Essays of an Octogenarian." It abounded with a wonderful collection of miscellaneous learning, the acquisition of a long life, and with interesting anecdotes of men and events, at once the most remarkable and stirring of modern history. Under the signature of "J.R.," he has been one of the ablest contributors to the *Gentleman's Magazine*, a periodical of well known merit, and full of curious information. As a magistrate, Mr Roche has been active, upright and humane, ever tempering the severity of justice with the gentleness of mercy, and more solicitous to reform than to punish. Exemplary in every relation of life, as a citizen and a man, he was respected by all classes, and beloved by those to whom his charity was more than liberal.

Not long since, his fellow citizens paid to his merit a striking tribute, by procuring his portrait for one of the public institutions of the city, and presenting him with an address embodying the expression of their affection, admiration and respect. It is a singular fact to record, that notwithstanding his extreme age, his fatal illness was his first.—*Cork Examiner of Yesterday.*
