

The house of Edward Barry, publican, Watergrass Hill, Cork, was destroyed by fire on Friday, and John Condon, of Fermoy, who slept there, burnt to death.

There is an increase of 20s on National bank shares, and Royal bank have receded 10s per cent.

A child was nearly killed by being run over by horse and car, at Patrick's Well, on Sunday.

After a month's interval, between the old and the new season, the Butter trade operations at Cork are being carried on, under the new system, of branding the proof tare, much to the satisfaction of the farmers. Under the old system empty firkins were branded fresh from the block, at the firkin crane, 2lbs over their actual weight. From shrinking, in dry weather, they generally lost another pound before they reached the farmer, who had then to bring up 3lb by steeping in water. Henceforward, empty firkins will be sent to the country without having any tares marked on them, and the proof tare only will be deducted at the time of sale.

A disgraceful outrage was lately perpetrated by the Claddagh fishermen. On Monday the Scotch Grey, trawling boat, the property of Mr Brown, while trawling in Galway bay, was pursued by a flotilla of Claddagh boats. When the crew of the trawler perceived this they immediately sunk her trawl with the buoy attached. The Claddaghmen followed up by giving chase to the Rev Mr Syng's boat, the crew of which also after letting down their trawls, and attached buoys, went off. The trawling gear of both vessels were destroyed, and doubtless, but for their timely escape, the crews would have been massacred. The Rev Mr Syng very narrowly escaped with his life from the infuriate mob. He was chased along the quay from the Canal locks to the Wooden bridge. His only mode of escape was to enter the river and endeavour to cross the canal; but the current being very strong he was obliged to hold on by a stone until he was rescued by the police. All the time he remained in the water the mob continued to pelt him with stones.
