

Last night the grandest assemblage of rank and fashion, seen in Dublin since the Inauguration, attended the *Dial Costume* of Lady Blakeney at the Royal Hospital. The elegant saloon was decorated with ancient martial banners and heraldic devices.

Major General Fleming, CB, accompanied by Lt Col Douglas, district Adjutant General, inspected the 92d Depot at Galway on Tuesday. After various manoeuvres and evolutions the Major General inspected the barracks, and expressed his gratification at the regularity of the arrangements, and the clean and orderly appearance of the men. Major General Fleming after the review proceeded to Ballinrobe. Four of the 92d officers are under orders to proceed to Gibraltar on the 27th inst.

Lt. Col. Cuppage, Royal Artillery, has replaced Lt. Col Warde in this garrison and district. Lt Col Cuppage entered the army in 1812, served in the Peninsula in 1814, at the sortie of Bayonne, and at Waterloo.

The Limerick enrolled Veteran companies, mustering 320 rank and file, will be called out for periodical drill and duty by Major Calder, Staff Officer, on the 23d and 24th inst.

On Thursday Thomas Putt and David Horrigan, privates of the 14th Regt. who died of protracted illness in the military hospital at new barrack, were interred together with customary honors, the coffins covered with a pall, being conveyed upon a gun carriage of the Artillery field battery, drawn by four black horses, preceded by the excellent band of the 14th Regt. playing the funeral dirge. Putt was a married man.

There will be a grand review of all the troops in Dublin at the Park on Tuesday next, the Queen's birthday, before the Lord Lieutenant and Sir Edward Blakeney, Commander of the army in Ireland. The force on the ground will be the 1st Dragoon Guards, Bays, 11th Hussars, 16th Lancers, Royal Artillery, 17th, 46th, 52d, 63d, 90th, 91st, and the Hibernian military school boys.
