The Poor Law Commissioners in England have com-
municated to the different authorities that persons
living five years in a given place in that country,
and not, if paupers, be sent back to Ireland, where
they were born, and left a burden there, in their old age
and crepitude, upon unions from which they had been
very long estranged.

Kilfinane, received a remittance of 50l this week, from

The Butter market of Kilfinane continues well sup-
plied. The large quantity of 1,419 firkins was bought
in the last three weeks, of which 781 were by Limerick
and 344 Tipperary, 148 Clonmel, and 146 by Cork
for resale in Cork. The highest price at Tues-
day market was 49s. 6d. per firkin, being an advance
of 1s. per firkin.

Atkinson's Lambay, by Harkaway, won two
times this week at Howth races, and Lord Waterford

A meeting of the Church of England Insurance
Company, took place on Friday, in London, when a
reduction of 8 per cent. was made to the proprietors and
a 10 per cent. reduction to the policy holders who have
acted on the scale of profits. The meeting was most

The Directors of the National Bank have contracted
