Mr. John O'Donnell, solicitor for the accused, submitted, intimating that his client had no knowledge whatever of the matter, and that so indignant did he feel at what had occurred that he not only gave up all the articles recognised as belonging to Captain Lowe, but had since resigned the pawnbroking trade. Capt. Lowe said he brought the case forward upon public grounds, and having no other object, was satisfied to withdraw his complaint, and not call for the infliction of the penalty prescribed by law, namely, double the amount lent upon each article.
