At Charleville Petty Sessions the only case of interest was brought by Capt. Friend, Government Emigration Officer, on behalf of Bridget Barry, against Daniel Clifton, of Charleville, who has been acting as emigrant agent, and gave her a ticket, which purported to be a passage ticket for £4, from Liverpool to New York, and which bore the signature of "Daniel Clifton, Charleville." The 61st section of the 15th and 16th Victoria, enacts that a person booking passengers, without license, was subject to a penalty not exceeding £50, and not less than 20l. ; and that the person so acting as emigration agent should have passed a bond, in two sureties of 500l. each. The 64th section enacts that a penalty not exceeding 20l. and not less than 5l. should be inflicted on any person taking money in lieu of passage without using a contract ticket as set forth in the schedule. The Chairman, Daniel Clanchy, Esq. said the decision of the court was that Mr. Clifton should return the 4l. he had received from the prosecutrix, and pay a fine of 5l. for acting as emigration agent without a legal licence.

EMIGRATION.—Any non-resident of this country can have little idea of the progress which emigration is making towards a total depopulation of this country. Were he, however, to mark the hundreds who daily pass through our towns on the route to England or America, the fact should stare him in the face, that agriculture was at an end in this portion of the Island, so far as manual labour was requisite. We look forward anxiously to the result of this general migration, for we cannot reconcile ourselves with the belief that the majority of those leaving Ireland will return; and there can be no second opinion that the tillage of the land to the same extent as hitherto, must cease. During the past month nearly every able-bodied labourer has left—aye, even to the aborigines of Achill—Ballycroy and the Islanders.—*Mayo Paper.*

PASTORAL ADDRESS OF THE BISHOP OF DUBLIN ASSEMBLED WITH THE CATHOLIC CLERGY AND LAITY. With sentiments of the profoundest grief, the Giver of all good gifts for the many years which He has watched over us amidst the trials and sorrows of our life, who has served us for happier days, we have lost a dearly beloved brethren, the late Rev.
