The Mayor of Limerick has called a special meeting of the Corporation on Friday, to take into consideration the course to be adopted by the council in reference to her Majesty's intended visit to Ireland.

The stag hunt on Killarney lakes was deferred to yesterday, but their Excellencies did not wait for it, having returned to Dublin.

The Lord Lieutenant and Countess St. Germans, accompanied by the Earl and Countess of Clancarty, Lord and Lady Donoughmore, Lord Massarene, Lady Anne Butler, Lord Dunloe, Hon.
