A fierce controversy has arisen between Mr. J F Maguire, M.P. and Mr. Sergeant Murphy, now English Insolvent Commissioner, upon the imputation of the latter, conveyed first under the signature of "Paul Pry," that the former had offered to give his support in Parliament to the present Ministry, if Mr. E. O'Flaherty, now Commissioner of the Income tax in Ireland, would be induced to abandon the petition against Mr. Maguire's return for Dungarvan last session. This charge Mr. Maguire indignantly meets with that emphatic negative—a *lie*! Sergeant Murphy, in a second letter, reveals himself, and states that Mr. Maguire waited upon him to solicit Mr. Hayter, of the Treasury, and the Duke of Newcastle, to use their influence with Mr. O'Flaherty to withdraw the petition. Mr. Maguire admits this, but denies that he offered to support the Government; and the Sergeant alleges that the equivalent was Mr. Maguire's assurance to him, for Mr. Hayter's information, that he would not oppose the Government. Mr. Maguire again challenges any proof of corrupt compromise on his part.
