The fourth edition of the *London Morning Chronicle* contains a despatch from its Vienna correspondent, dated Monday evening, that against the advice of the Four Powers the Sultan has signed the declaration of war against Russia. Saturday last district Courts Martial were commenced at Birr barracks, to try each of the escort of the Depot 1st Royals who were conveying from Maryboro' to Athlone, a deserter from the Royal Artillery, named Joseph Fitzsimons, who on attempting to escape at Rosenallis, Queen's County, was fired at and seriously wounded during the struggle for his apprehension. Each of the escort, which was composed of Sergeant Waterson, Privates Portlock, Chamberlain, Leenan and Connelly were separately tried, except Connelly who fired the shot, and who has been committed for trial at Maryboro' gaizes. The court is composed of Major Farren, 47th Depot, President, and 6 other officers belonging to the 1st Royals and 47th Foot. The charge upon which the prisoners have been arraigned is that they were drunk whilst on duty, and under arms, and further, that they permitted the deserter abovenamed to escape.
