Monday last, the inhabitants and numerous visitors at Kilkee were thrown into consternation, on hearing that a man from the county of Limerick, lodging near the sea had cut his throat. Some women who witnessed the act, ran to Mr. Martin Mahony, who resides quite near where the scene occurred and requested his assistance. Mr. Mahony ran to the yard door opposite but the unfortunate man on seeing him approach closed the back door and escaped by the front door to the sea, bleeding profusely from ear to ear, and armed with a knife. Mr. Mahony pursued and prevented him plunging into the sea; the man then became quite exhausted. Constable Thompson who happened to be near, immediately procured the assistance of Dr. Griffin, but it is feared the wound is of too serious a nature (as his wind pipe was cut) to expect a recovery. It appears the unfortunate man, whose name is Murphy, exhibited symptoms of insanity for the last seven months; he is from Newcastle, in this county, and was left at Kilkee in the care of a young boy of 9 years of age.
