FUNERAL OF WYNDHAM GOOLD, ESQ., M.P.
The remains of the late Wyndham Goold, Esq., M.P. for this County, arrived here last evening by railway train from Dublin, and a family carriage being in waiting at the terminus, the coffin was conveyed thence to No. 1, Tontine Buildings, where rites were placed for the night, and this morning at half-past ten o'clock the funeral took place. Long before the appointed time crowds of the tenantry and labourers on the estate in this County of which the late lamented gentleman was proprietor, assembled at the Crescent, George's street and Tontine Buildings, to pay the last sad tribute of respect to one who was beloved every one of them for the exceeding kind and gentle disposition of his nature.

The funeral arrangements having been all satisfactorily and most respectably conducted by Mr. Torkington, of Dawson-street, Dublin, the sarcophagus was again placed in the hearse, drawn by six horses in sable trapping, and surmounted by rich white plumes. The tenantry, on horse-back, wearing white scarfs and hat bands, led the cavalcade, six abreast, to the number of 200. The hearse followed, and amongst the private equipages in the rere, were those of the Earl Dunraven, Lord Cloncurry, Archdeacon Goold, the Hon. Wyndham Quin, Lord Clarina, Wm. Monsell, M.P. the Mayor, Major Gavin, High Sheriff; the Lord Bishop of Limerick, Sir Vere de Vere, Ven. Archdeacon Maunsell, Dean Kirwan, Castle Hackett; Archdeacon Keatinge, Rev. Augustus Maunsell, John Watson Mahony, Stephen de Vere, Mrs. D. Gabbett, Francis Spaight, John Kelly, D.L. Henry Maunsell, Francis Grene, (Sheriff elect); James Bannatyne, Capt. H. Jackson, Croker Barrington, Henry O'Shea, (Mayor elect); William Franklin, Provincial Bank; John Mas-y, Tipperary; James Barry, Michl. Furnell, D.L., George Furnell, Gamaliel Fitzgerald, Robert Hunt, Peter O'Brien, Pierce G. Barron, John T. Devitt, Capt. Gavin, &c. The Rev. Messrs. O'Rourke (P.P. On the route to Adare the mournful procession was augmented at every point, and the remains were interred in the mausoleum of the noble family of Quin, after the usual solemn service at Adare church, which was read by Archdeacon Warburton and Rev. A. Maunsell. The lamentations of the peasantry, especially the females, were loud and almost irrepressible on this truly sad occasion.
