The last three or four days opening with cloudy vapor, and departing under the same misty complexion, had nevertheless a bracing and wholesome temperature, welcome after so much rain and moisture. Yesterday the cold frosty air yielded to the soft influence of rain, which came down gently, but a total change of weather more genial to this season, is again apparently at hand.

Lord Portarlington's Tipperary, Golden Vein estate was sold in Dublin yesterday for 274,160*l*.

A fleet of ten colliers laden with coals, arrived in this port since Sunday last.

Thomas Costelloe, Esq. Coroner, held an inquest on Monday, at Upper Cecil-street, on the body of David Ahern, foreman carpenter, and clerk of Mr. Duggan, builder. From the evidence it appeared that deceased was the person who had been observed fall into the river at Russell's quay, last Thursday night, and the jury returned a verdict that he was drowned in the river Shannon on the 11th inst. adding a recommendation that the attention of the harbour Commissioners be called to the unprotected state of the lower quays.

Yesterday morning the body of a man, name unknown, was seen floating upon the waters above the second lock of the Canal, and the police of George's quay station had it removed to Barrington's hospital, there to await a coroner's inquest. Deceased is in such a state of decomposition, that it is supposed the body had been a month in the waters of the Shannon.

An inquest was held this day at Barrington's hospital, before Thomas Costelloe, Esq. Coroner, on the body of Margaret Halpin, who fell from a window 3 stories high, near John-square, while putting out clothes to dry. It appeared, from the evidence of the resident medical officer, Dr. Burke, that deceased was admitted on the 11th inst. suffering with general injuries of the head and body, and from the effects of which she died on the 15th. Verdict—accidental death.

At the City Police Court on Monday, Catherine Riggs and Bridget Connors, cyprians, for being drunk and disorderly were sentenced to one month each; 14 drunkards were fined 2*s* 6*d* each, and three persons taken upon suspicion of deserters were remanded.

Amongst the prisoners brought up at the City Police Court yesterday, was notorious 'Bill Danagher (Josey),' charged with drunkenness and annoying the streets. He was attired in military uniform, sported the red coat, and had cultivated an extraordinary moustache, twisted to a fine point at both sides of the face. The assumed dignity of 'Bill' did not weigh with the court, tho' he repeatedly pledged 'his honour' that if let off he would not offend again. The Bench sentenced the incorrigible to 2 months imprisonment.
