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SUICIDE.—A lamentable case of suicide occurred in this city on Sunday morning, when Mr. James Winder, shipwright, and proprietor of a respectable spirit shop and tavern in Lower Gletworth-st., put a period to his existence under the following circumstances:—For a fortnight previous deceased was confined to bed with rheumatic gout, and during his illness, displayed gloom and despondency, which alarmed his medical attendants, Dr. Russell, and Mr. E. Honan, Apothecary, by whose advice his wife and relatives took the precaution of removing from his sleeping apartment, razors and other articles of a dangerous nature. Saturday he appeared to have rallied, and was advised to sit up, but he declined to do so, at the same time evidencing no additional symptoms calculated to increase apprehension. On Sunday morning, Mrs. Winder, who had been sleeping in the same bed with her husband, in a back dormitory on the third story, arose, leaving him to repose, and was in the act of dressing when the postman knocked with a letter, and she proceeded down the first landing of the staircase to receive same from the servant, and returning to the bed-room, just as she entered the apartment beheld her husband throw himself out of the window into the yard beneath, where his head was literally smashed, the brains protruding, and he died on the spot. The right leg of the unfortunate man was also broken in two places. Horror stricken, Mrs. Winder fell into hysterics, when her screams roused the inmates to the full extent of the dreadful tragedy. In the afternoon Dr. Murphy, coroner, held an inquest on the body of Mr. Winder, and the jury returned a verdict that deceased was killed by throwing himself from a bed-room window, while in a state of temporary delirium.

On Sunday evening Dr. Murphy, coroner, held an inquest upon the body of the infant found in the Cathedral Church yard the day previous, rolled up in a cloth. The jury, according to medical testimony, found that the babe was still born.

A relative by marriage, of Mrs. Mary Jackson, (sister of Mrs. Lawrence, who destroyed her child and then put a period to her own existence with her husband's razer) called at this office yesterday to contradict a paragraph which went the rounds of the press, to the effect that she (Mrs. Jackson) also attempted to commit suicide. The explanation he gave was, that the young woman being excited and nervous, consequent upon the melancholy fate of Mrs. Lawrence, drank rather freely of ardent spirits, which caused her conduct to be remarked.
