On Yesterday evening as a lighter, laden with corn from O'Brien's Bridge, was coming into the near look of the canal, a quarrel arose between two men on board, James Mulqueen and Thos. Carey, both natives of O'Brien's Bridge. Mulqueen was under the influence of liquor, and Carey said he was not fit to be at the helm, on which a quarrel arose between them, and Mulqueen was thrown into the canal and drowned. Mr. Riedy, clerk to Messrs. J. N. Russell & Sons, jumped in after him, but failed to rescue the unfortunate man. Carey then ran away, but, when intelligence was given to the Police, Constables Mercer and Shiels started in pursuit and captured him. The body of Mulqueen was taken to Barrington's hospital, where it awaits an inquest.

At the City Police Court this day, Mary Johnson was sent to gaol for 14 days for immoral conduct near the military road, the Bench remarking that it was too bad that the unfortunate women were to be the only parties punished for these offences, while the soldiers were let go. Three women with children in their arms were charged with vagrancy, and annoying the officers of the workhouse. They were sent to

juil for fourteen days each.

This day Mr. Clanchy, High Constable, seized two pigs at the market, which were in a tainted condition. He at once called on the market jury, who condemned them as unfit for human food. The Mayor ordered them to be burned, and fined the owner.

At Clonlara Petty Sessions yesterday, a man named Considine, commonly called "the Badger," was summoned at the suit of Admiral O'Grady, for poaching on a several fishery.
