LIMERICK UNION—THIS DAY.—Mr. John Barrington presided at the meeting of the Limerick Board of Guardians this day. The question of walling-in the graveyard was referred to a committee, and a hope was expressed that it would be soon consecrated.—The Board ordered, in pursuance of a recommendation of the Visiting Committee, that the boys should be employed to till the plot of ground at the rear of the Lock hospital. These plots of ground, consisting of about two acres, are not at present required for any purpose, and by adopting the course recommended, the visiting committee are of opinion, that the boys could acquire some practical knowledge of agriculture which would fit them to fill situations as farm servants, and that a plentiful supply of vegetables for the soup could in this way be obtained, thus preventing the spread of skin disease. The remaining business was of a mere routine nature. State of the house:—Remaining last report, 1,770; admitted in the week, 104; discharged, 144; died, 5; remaining on Saturday last, 1,725. State of the funds: lodged in the week of new rate, £808 2s; lodged by Mr. Naish, half year's rent paid by the Ordnance for Boherbuoy, £200; paid £4 1s; balance in favour of guardians, £2,615 17s 3d.

It is supposed that the entire of the Poor-law Inspectors in Ireland, will be dispensed with. Pauperism has greatly decreased.

In Gort workhouse there are 293 paupers; in Ballyvaughan 351.

A little girl named Margaret Crowe, aged about 12 years, while taking a kettle of water out of the river at the Sand-quay, on Monday evening, fell in and was drowned. The body has not been found yet.

The *Iron Duke*, under its valued Commander, Capt. Triphook, was detained last night some hours at sea through some slight derangement of her machinery.—The passengers were greatly alarmed.

An enterprising English merchant, the owner of several stores and mills in Westport, is about to run a steamer between Liverpool and that town.

Mr. T. Curran, proprietor of a drapery establishment at Queenstown, is committed for trial for stealing nine gold rings from a questionable lady at North-st. Cork. The magistrates refused to accept bail.

Four of the Town Councillors of Belfast have resigned.
