

The only demonstration of rejoicing made in Cork, consequent upon the fall of Sebastopol, was the hawking of a blazing tar barrel through the streets.

The salmon fishery close season commenced this day, when rod and line fishing ceased.

Yesterday at the Petty Sessions of Kilmallock, Jeremiah Lynch and John Lyons were convicted at the prosecution of Mr. Alton, and fined 10s. each and costs, for using bow nets in the river Maigue.

The body of a fine male child between three and four months old was discovered in the river Maigue near Court bridge, yesterday morning, by some boys. It had a strong cord round the neck and a stone attached to it. The body was conveyed to the adjoining Police Barrack to await an inquest.

Salonica Indian corn was sold by auction in Cork this week at £9 7s. 6d. to £8 12s. 6d. per ton, and bright and middling sugars at 41s. per cwt.

The ministers' money tax in Waterford amounts to £571, and the Corporation have appointed a committee to devise means of avoiding the assessment thereof on the city.

The shop of Miss Flood, at Thomondgate, was burglariously entered on Thursday night, and rifled of money, whiskey, and bread. The shop of Mr. John O'Brien, in same locality, was also forced open, but the lodgers up stairs gave the alarm, and saved property on the premises. There is no watchman in that part of the suburbs.

There is not a prisoner in Nenagh gaol under sentence of penal servitude, as they were all removed this week to Spike-island convict depot.

Thirty-two convicts, 17 male and 15 female, left Clonmel, the former for the Mountjoy government prison, and the latter for Spike Island convict depot.—Amongst the manacled and wearing the prison dress was Dalton, the architect, who pleaded guilty to the forgery of the Marquis of Waterford's name to bills of exchange amounting to £1,600, and sentenced to four years penal servitude.
