FUNERAL OF THE LATE ARCHDEACON WARBURTON.

Yesterday morning, at ten o'clock, the mortal remains of this much lamented clergyman were removed from the Rectory of Rathkeale to the parish Church for interment. Long before the appointed hour a large number of the humbler class assembled to pay a last tribute of respect to the memory of one who had so long lived amongst them as a friend and benefactor.— Most of the nobility, clergy, and gentry of the surrounding district were in attendance, amongst whom were Earl Dunraven, Lord Clarina, Messrs. Maxwell, Massy Lloyd, Evans, Hewson, Maunsell, Delmege, Vandeleur; Revds. W. Archer, E. Hassard, G. Maxwell, C. Hare, T. Willis. T. F. G. Plummer, A. C. L. Coghlan, H. Sadleir, A. Nash, J. S. Franks, G. G. Gubbins and several Roman Catholic clergymen, amongst whom was Archdeacon Fitzgerald, P.P. of Rathkeale. The procession moved in the following order—A large number of mounted tenantry, wearing scarfs and hat bands; the labourers, wearing hat bands; the female servants, in hoods and cloaks; the officiating clergymen, Revds. A. Nash and J. S. Franks. The funeral car, drawn by four horses, in sable covering, bearing the body of deceased, in an oak sarcophagus, covered with black, and in which was a shell and lead coffin—Engraved on the plate was "The Ven. Charles Warburton, Archdeacon of Tuam, and Rector of Rathkeale, died December 12, 1855, Aged 75 years." The chief mourners—the sons, sons-in-law, brother-in-law and nephews of deceased, after which a large number of gentlemen wearing crape weepers and black gloves; next the clergy, wearing scarfs and hatbands; the cavalcade filled up with a number of the shopkeepers and inhabitants of Rathkeale, who had all closed their shops as a mark of respect to the deceased. On arriving at the church the body was borne to the aisle, where the funeral service was read by Revds. A. Nash and J. S. Franks. The body was then placed in a new vault prepared for its reception. The arrangements for the funeral were made by Mr. John James, of the firm of James & Son, upholsterers, George-st.
