**PANORAMA.**—The Panorama of the war of 1812, announced for exhibition in Limerick, and painted by M. Gompertz in the Rotunda, Dublin, is, independently of the attractive subject, one of the best illustrations of the war, and seen for many years. The views are well painted and taken from the most interesting points. A beautiful picture of the harbor of Brest precedes the embarkation of the English, French and Turkish troops, and the fleet under sail is capital. This is followed in pictorial effect by the debarkation of the troops; and, this part, the spectator moves over the steppes to the burning village of the dreadful battle field of Alma.—The trenches, to Chapman's and Gorodnitskaya, and all the incidents of that memorable day.
