It is rumoured that parliament will be adjourned for a fortnight immediately on the opening of the house.

The Administration of War in Sweden has with drawn from the Treasury one million one hundred thousand francs, to be applied to the defence urgently required by the nation.

Edward Bernard, Esq., of Newborough House, has been appointed to the Commission of the Peace for this County.

In the Encumbered Estates Court, yesterday, in the matter of Peter Smithwick, Esq., M.D., and Michael Apjohn, Mr. W. B. Atkinson purchased the lands of Jamestown and Ballycarvon, Barony of Costlea, County Limerick, containing 981 acres for £1,500.

Messrs. John and Edward Synan, of Fedamore, purchased in the Encumbered Estates Court, on yesterday, after a spirited contest, 860 acres of the lands of Rathjordan, in this county. The bidding was carried on principally by Messrs. Synan and Smithwick, when the lands were ultimately knocked down for the Messrs. Synan. Rathjordan lies near Herbertstown, and is considered among the best land in the county Limerick.

COURT OF QUEEN'S BENCH.

William O'Brien v. Maurice Lenihan.

This case has been arranged on the terms of the defendant paying £40 in addition to the £10 lodged in Court as damages, and the plaintiff's costs as between attorney and client. CITY POLICE COURT—YESTERDAY.—Daniel King, for larceny of two spades from Thos. Kinnevene 14 days imprisonment with hard labour, William Pain, John Wilson and John Chivel, soldiers, remained on Monday for a violent assault on the police, and obstructing them in the execution of their duty, were fined £1 each or a months imprisonment. Michl. Gavin, drunk 3s. 6d. or 48 hours. Edward Lee, drunk and using abusive language to the police to give Bail, two sureties in £5 each, and himself in £10, and to remain in Jail until he does so. William Clifford, larceny from Michl. Furnell, Esq., Remanded till Friday, Matthew Hanrahan, drunk, 2s. 6d. or 24 hours.

At the City Police Court this day, John Hogan and Michael Sheedy were brought up by Constable Nash for burglariously breaking into and robbing the house of John Mahony, at Pallasgrean and taking therefrom a quantity of wearing apparel, which Constable Nash detected them in the act of pledging and selling in this city. The prisoners were sent for trial to the assizes.

DEATH OF

PATRICK JOSEPH CONNELL, ESQ.

It is with no ordinary feelings of grief and sorrow that we approach the painful duty of recording the death of PATRICK J. CONNELL, Esq. which occurred at half-past eight o'clock on Sunday night, at his residence, Upper Henry-street, to the deep and inexpressible regret of his attached relatives and friends, and, who, knowing him, recognised in his person, his character, and all his attributes, in the fullest sense of the world, "an honest man, the noblest work of God."

For the last Thirty-four years he held, without one hour's interruption, the chief management of the Editorial and Literary department of the LIMERICK CHRONICLE. Of how he discharged the onerous and responsible duties which thereon devolved upon him it is not our province to pronounce; but we should feel it a deep dereliction of that just debt of gratitude which the services of the just and faithful servant should command, were we not to express the thoroughly heartfelt tribute of our esteem for his upright character, and of regard and respect for his honored memory.

PATRICK J. CONNELL was in many respects a remarkable man.—Endowed with singular natural abilities, which were well cultivated and developed by early education, he added to them the qualifications of untiring industry and indefatigable devotion to his professional labours. It was not every one who, in business transactions, was brought into communication with him, could understand or appreciate the true character of Mr. CONNELL. He possessed, in the highest degree, those qualities which dignify and adorn the character of man—Upright, steadfast, generous and just. A truer friend, to those who were admitted to his friendship, never breathed life's breath—a more kindly or courteous man, in his intercourse with all who had to communicate with him in his professional avocations, never existed. Many a one who enjoyed his personal acquaintance will recognise, in this feeble outline, the genuine worth and purity of the lamented deceased. Of the character and relations of Mr. CONNELL in private life we shall not obtrude on the deep and sacred sorrow which has fallen, as a heavy cloud, over his afflicted household; let it be sufficient to say, that for those whom the will of Providence consigned to his care and dependence his solicitude was ever untiring and unbounded. In every relation of life he fulfilled all the duties of a true Christian, and when at the moment of his lamented decease, while wailing relatives and sorrowing friends stood plunged in deep affliction around the deathbed, the most alleviating relief that presented itself before their mind, was these consoling words of Holy Writ—"The souls of the Just are in the hands of God, and the darkness of Death shall not touch them."

Few had known of his premature decease, and fewer still of the time assigned for his interment; yet, ere the mists of early morning had been dispelled, many a sad and sorrowing heart had congregated around his residence to pay the last tribute of affection and esteem to one whose memory was endeared to them by every recollection that could enchain or affect the human mind. The Revds. James Synan and Bergin preceded the hearse, reciting the office for the dead, and it was followed by a band of sorrowful mourners—the chief mourners being his four nephews, the Messrs. HALL; next followed other immediate relatives, several of the City Magistrates, members of the Corporation, citizens, private friends, and every one connected in any degree with the CHRONICLE office, whose sorrowing tears, as his mortal remains were committed to their last resting place, bespoke, more than words could express, the reverential affection with which they regarded the lamented deceased. And when the moment had passed which consigned to his peaceful rest, in the silent tomb, all that was mortal of PATRICK JOSEPH CONNELL, there could be found but few dry eyes amid the leafless branches in that old churchyard of Kileely, in whose bosom of mother earth reposes the body of one who awaiteth, in confidence in his Saviour's redemptory sacrifice, "that rest which remaineth for the people of God."

It is with extreme regret we have to announce the death of Major Snodgrass, 96th, Regt. a most distinguished officer, and one who had seen a great deal of service, and who was to the younger officers of his Regt. ever affable, courteous and kind.

INCREASE OF PAY TO CAPTAINS, RN.—In accordance with the remarks contained in our last, we have now the Rates of pay to Captains in commission:—The first 70 to receive £701 2s 1d. per annum; the next 100, £574 17s 6d.; all others £450 3s. 4d. Commodores, whose pendants are now flying, will not benefit by this arrangement until the first of April next.

Lieut. Scriven is appointed superintendent of the Downport Sailors' Home, vice Stokes, resigned through ill health.

The Court of Queen's Bench have granted a Conditional order, at suit of the Poor Law Commissioners, against the Guardians of the Bandon Union, to recover £275, costs of proceeding connected with the litigation which took place with another union.

LIMERICK UNION.—The usual weekly meeting of the Board of Guardians of this union was held this day, John Barrington Esq. in the chair, admitted during the week, 156; discharged, 137; died, 12. Finance—lodged during the week 252l. 3s 5d; paid do. 39l. 2s 9d; balance in Bank in favour of the Guardians £4,581 8s 8d. Mr. Thomas Tierney from the Galway model school, was elected assistant schoolmaster at £20 per annum with rations and apartments, and Miss Simmons, hospital nurse, at £10 per annum with rations and apartments.

The daily average degrees of cream produced by the milk supplied to the Croom Union for the past two months was not under 15 degrees, and went up for the last four weeks to a daily average of 18 degrees.
