AN ANNIVERSARY SERVICES.

Last, two excellent sermons were preached in the Wesleyan Chapel, George's-street, to large and numerous congregations, by the Rev. Robert G. ... and on each occasion the collections for the Circuit funds, received very liberal contributions amounting to £40.

On the following evening, the annual soiree was given in the same Chapel, and was numerously and well attended by the members of the Methodist Church, and many sympathizing friends of other denominations. The chair was filled by Thomas G. ... Esq. and on the platform were the representatives of the Non-conformist Churches in the neighbourhood, and many lay friends, hearty in their support of the cause. The Chairman having briefly expressed his satisfaction at the gratifying sight of so many different denominations uniting with brotherly love in social fellowship, then introduced

David Wilson (Presbyterian) who addressed the meeting on the very important and now much discussed subject of the "Christian Sabbath"—its origin, design, and permanent obligation.—The gentleman deprecated the attempts now being made to divest it of its sacred sanction, by throwing it out of the public eye, and proposed the introduction of music for popular entertainments, and the prohibition of certain legislators, that day which has hallowed from the dawn of time, and which has made it a great pause in nature, amid the bustle of the world, and which may undistractedly contemplate the glorious and cloudless eternal rest, of which the earthly life is but an emblem and a shadow.—The audience were enraptured with Mr. Wilson's address, and their response to his powerful appeal, by a unanimous vote.

W. Craig (Methodist) spoke with consideration on his allotted subject, "The Pulpit," and fully shewed its importance and vast utility, and the condition of those countries where the public ministrations are unshackled, as contrasted with those of our islands, in which the minister is "an ambassador."

W. Tarbotton (Independent) next addressed the meeting, and in consideration of the topic allotted to him—"The platform"—displayed his views in a very plain and admirable style. The Rev. gentleman said that mainly we are indebted to a free platform for our rights—national, social, or religious; and that many of the just political changes of our days are the offspring of the platform, and as to their utility and hold on the public mind, the source; the influence too of the platform on the moral and spirit of the Church of God, in its various missionary and other benevolent operations, was amply exemplified by the Rev. gentleman, and which gave great satisfaction.
