ACCIDENTS.—A woman named Kate Rahilly, was
 run over on Saturday morning by a horse and car at
 the cross of William-street, and had her leg fearfully
 broken in two places. She was immediately removed
 to Barrington's Hospital and had scarcely been put
 in bed, when a Boy, named John Hogan, was brought
 into from the Strand, with a dangerous compound
 fracture of his leg. Doctor Gore having been sent
 for was promptly on the spot; the latter case occur-
 red in the factory of Messrs. Russell. Several cases
 of severe accident were admitted into the Hospital
 this last week, viz. :—Kate Mullins, fracture of her
 thigh; Michael Hanan, fracture of his hand; Anne
 Fitzgerald, dislocated ankle; Mary Bourke, fracture
 of the thigh; and Bidly Flynn, on whom a part of
 the gable of a house had fallen, with a bad compound
 fracture of the leg, serious injury to the chest and
 back, of which she died. A poor man was also taken
 into Hospital in an apparent state of drunkenness, who
 had only been discharged some days previously, after
 having been rescued from an attempt at drowning. It
 was evident he was labouring under disease in his
 head, and although every effort was made to save
 him, he died next morning.

The recruiting party of the 7th stationed at Ar-
 magh has been recalled, and ordered to rejoin the

 from Tilbury Fort, having been discharged from the
