 pure Arab blood. His young stock is able to be com-

PERFORMANCES.

FREDERICK, in 1845, won the Down Royal
 Corporation Plate at the Maze, beating Deception and
 The Coiner ; he walked over for the Castlereagh cup
 same meeting. In 1846 he again won the Down Royal
 Corporation Plate at the Maze, beating Mrs. Candle,
 by Voltaire ; and also walked over for the Castlereagh
 cup. At the Maze October meeting same year he
 walked over for the Brownlow cup. In 1847 he ran
 third for the Great Liverpool Steeple-chase, carrying
 11st. 2lb., the winner, tho' aged, carrying only 10st.
 6lb.—thus proving himself decidedly the best horse
 in the race, though not its winner.

FREDERICK was exhibited for the first time at
 the Great Show in Killarney in 1853, and obtained the
 First Prize for the best Stallion exhibited. A Foal
 got by him obtained the First Prize of 10l. at Carlow
 in 1855, and 40l. was refused for him by his owner,
 Mr. Cavanagh, Harold's Cross, county Dublin.

From his superior shape, extraordinary muscular
 power, unrivalled combination of both a Race and a
 Steeple-chase Horse, with his acknowledged superiority
 of breeding over every other Sire presented to the
 Public this season, there cannot be a doubt that
