The riotous and serious character have taken place at Malta, between the British Legion and Police. A Spectator of Police was killed, and an Officer of Police dangerously wounded.

Mr. Mahon, M.P. has given notice of a motion in the House of Commons for the 3rd June, for the appointment of a select committee to investigate the operation of the recent statutes relating to the sea fisheries of Ireland and to consider the expediency of re-assimilating the law of Ireland on that point to the law of England.

The 25th June has been fixed for the second reading of Mr. Spooner's bill in reference to the Poor Law Amendment Act.

A bill introduced by Lord Brougham, intituled, "An Act to amend the Joint-stock Companies' Registration Acts, 1848-9," is considered to have passed to the Tipperary Joint-stock Bank, and, it is expected, will militate against the depositors to a certain extent.

Sergeant O'Brien, M.P. the Attorney-General, Mr. Deasy, have arrived in Dublin from London. The Countess of Seafield and Captain Godfrey have arrived at Grant Lodge, Elgin, N.B. London.

Mr. L. Blossie, Bart. and Lady Blossie, have arrived at their residence, Athavilla, county Mayo.

The works of the Tralee and Killarney railway commenced on Friday.

A visitor, returned from London remarks, that a dinner of soups, fish and meat, is provided at the Shades, Leicester-square, with the best appendages, at 1s. 6d. per head. The prices in Dublin are 20 per cent. higher.

A farmer named James Costelloe, from near Killaloe, died on Saturday from the effects of injuries he received by his horse "taking head" with him on the previous Saturday. The horse took fright at a little girl skipping on the road.

The wife of a farmer, near Bruff, was killed on Monday, having been thrown off a car, and received a severe fracture in the head.

A carman, named Patrick Garvey, in the employ of Mr. J. Bernal, dropped suddenly dead while at work at Cary's-road, on Monday.

A little boy, named Hannan, was stabbed by a play fellow in the cheek, on Monday, and is now in Barrington's hospital.

A woman named Rea, 90 years of age, was admitted into Barrington's hospital, suffering from a dangerous cut in the head; a box, which was thrown at another woman, having struck her.

As a respectable farmer, residing within four miles of Skibbereen, named John Collins, of Coornishal, was leaving that town on Sunday, when getting up on a young mare, she suddenly turned round, throwing him violently, and his head coming in contact with the ground, caused instantaneous death.

TIPPERARY JOINT STOCK BANK.

The last two days Master Murphy has been engaged with applications on behalf of Irish and English shareholders whose names appeared on the lists, but who claim exemption from liabilities upon the ground of having been duped by the late Mr. Sadlier. The inquiry has not concluded.—Report in next CHRONICLE.

POLICE OFFICE—At the City police court on Monday, there were five magistrates on the bench, and 16 prisoners for trial. Owen Byrne was sentenced to 48 hours imprisonment for larceny of straw; Samuel Benson for drunkenness, and assaulting a soldier, was fined 5s. Five persons brought up for drunkenness were discharged, having been in custody since Saturday night. Edward Danaher was sentenced to seven days imprisonment for trespassing on the grounds of the asylum; John Bourke was charged with being a deserter from the 18th regiment. It was ordered that the case should be reported to the War Office. Michael Walsh was fined 1s. for being drunk; James Barry was sentenced to 48 hours imprisonment for vagrancy.

At the Police Court, yesterday, there were four Magistrates in attendance, and twelve prisoners for trial. Thomas Benson was charged with absconding from his master, Joseph Dodding, Captain of the Brig "Ardent." The prisoner had been an apprentice—and ran away from the ship at Cardiff, in Wales, on the 7th June, 1855, and was now on board the brig Sampson, lying in this port. The magistrates ruled that if he did not return to fill up the term of his apprenticeship he should be sentenced to 28 days imprisonment.
