PRESBYTERIAN SYNOD.—The Presbyterian Synod of Dublin, consisting of the Presbyteries of Athlone, Limerick, Connaught, Cork, Dublin, Munster, and Newry, met in Kilkenny on Tuesday, the 13th inst. at 12 o'clock. The Moderator, the Rev. Wm. M'Kee, preached from Eph. 2, 20, and constituted the meeting by prayer. The Rev. H. S. M'Kee was chosen moderator for the present year, the reports of the different Presbyteries were then read, after which the Synod was occupied with an appeal against the resignation of the Cork Presbytery, in reference to the acceptance of the chaplaincy at Spike Island, by the Rev. E. B. Gibson, of Mallow. The entire case was referred to the Cork Presbytery again, and the Moderator, Rev. Richard Dill, Dr. Kirkpatrick, and Rev. John Wilson, were appointed commissioners to aid the Presbytery in this matter. The Presbytery advised by the commissioners, resolved to permit Mr. Gibson to resign the congregation of Mallow, and to accept the Presbyterian chaplaincy at Spike. Of this resolution the Synod unanimously approved. An overture was passed to the general assembly, to take steps to procure for Presbyterians a fuller representation on the board of national education. The great subject of missions occupied much of the attention of the court. The different Presbyteries reported on the results of congregational collections for the various mission schemes, and defaulting congregations were enjoined to attend to the order of assembly on the subject. The proceedings of this Synod were brought to a close on Wednesday at 2 o'clock, when a public meeting was held to hear some account of the operations of the Presbyterian Church in her various fields of missionary enterprise, embracing the Foreign mission in India, the Jewish mission in the East and on the continent of Europe; the colonial mission in New South Wales, Canada, Australia, and New Zealand, and the home mission in its two departments in Ireland. At this meeting interesting addresses were delivered by the Revs. Dr. Kirkpatrick and Rev. Hunter Brown of Turlough, and Wilson of Limerick.

We beg to remind our readers that the Rev. Dr. Cooke will preach in the Presbyterian Church, Glenthorne-street, on to-morrow. Dr. Cooke is well known as a profound Theologian, and an eloquent preacher. This is his first visit to our city, and we are satisfied that he will avail themselves of the present opportunity of hearing this distinguished champion of Protestantism.

The Rev. Mr. Tarbotton, of this city, preached in the first Independent chapel in London. His report of lead pipe having been stolen last week from Claresford House, Killaloe, is without foundation.

Mahony. He was formerly Captain in HM 37th Regt.—was Mayor of this city in 1838, and was City Treasurer for several years; he also filled the office of Vice-Guardian for some time, and in all the avocations he was placed in he evinced an untiring zeal and integrity. He was an affectionate husband, a fond father, a constant friend, and a kind-hearted benevolent man. His death is a source of poignant affliction to his sorrowing relatives, and it will be regretted by a large circle of sincere and attached friends. Capt. Fitzgerald was universally esteemed and regretted by all classes of his fellow-citizens. In private life his kind disposition, frank and affectionate manners, attached every one to him. In all the vicissitudes of this varied life he met its crosses with fortitude and resignation, placing his confidence in the Sovereign will of Providence. His remains were interred at the new cemetery, Sydney, and his funeral was numerously attended.
