These examples show the respective amount of Bonus ALREADY DECLARED and VESTED provision made at the last investigation of an INTERMEDIATE BONUS of policies becoming Claims by death during the present Septennial period, the whole amount payable under the above Policies, in addition to the risks now emerging, would be more than those stated in the last column, supposing the life assured by the first Policy during the present year, the amount payable on the £1000 Policy would be, not £2031 £ 173 5s. 2d.

In all cases where the member is not in any way from dealing with his Policy, or from converting the Reversionary Claim into a present Bonus has been added to it, into a present payment in cash, or of applying the same towards extinction or reduction of the future Bonus. As showing the effect of such conversion, the cases of two of the above Policies are taken.

Or, he might surrender the reversionary claim and receive a bonus to the extent of £467 12s. 1d. from any further payment of the premium in terms of the policy, retaining a claim for the remainder of the additions already made, £122 9s. 9d. and for any further additions declared in future.

In the case of the third Policy, to which additions of £407 12s 3d. the member surrendering these, might either receive a sum of £12s 9d. in cash, or he might have all the premiums exigible in terms of the policy, in addition to the original amount of £31 17s 6d. to which he might, by renouncing right to the £6d. of the bonus, have the premiums payable in terms of the policy from this date to the year 1859, four in number, extinguished, reserving to himself a balance of £203, 6s 9d. and for any further additions by way of bonus to be afterwards declared.
