At the City Police Court yesterday Daniel M'Namara was fined 2s. 6d. and costs for being drunk; Margaret Shea, for larceny of wearing apparel, was sentenced to a month's imprisonment; Wm. Watt, being drunk on Monday night in the streets, fined 5s. or 48 hours; Anne M'Carthy, being drunk and annoying a gentleman in the streets on Monday night, seven days imprisonment; Thomas Irwin was sent to gaol for a week for stealing bottles and a jar from Mr. Thomas Ryan, whilst in his employment as porter. A boy named Michael M'Grath was prosecuted by his father for stealing and pawning some articles of dress. The father stated that he could get no good of his son, as he was associating with pickpockets and others; that he would not go to school or do anything else for him; and that he had stopped away altogether from him for the last month. The boy having pro- mised to amend and be good for the future, his father assented to take him home again and give him another trial. The magistrates cautioned him that if any charge was proved against him again he would be severely punished.
