tenants on his estate was the subject of general envy.
In times of the greatest depression, he was never
known to resort to evictions, and his tenantry en-
joyed in consequence a rare degree of happiness and
security. There are few who remembering the name
of the good old lord, associated ever with acts of
benevolence and charity, but will hear with regret
that his long and honourable life has at last been
closed. It is to be hoped that the estimable disposi-
tions which report attributes to the present Earl will,
under the administration of his lordship's present
agent, render him a worthy successor to the honours
and estate of his lamented father.

The Earl of Cork, K.P., was the oldest general in
the army. He served in Flanders in 1793, and was
present at the Sieges of Valenciennes and Dunkirk,
at the former of which he was one of the storming
party. In 1794 he accompanied the expedition under
Lord Morra, and was present at the Battle of Alost,
and made prisoner at the capitulation of Bergen-op-
Zoom; served with the Guards in Holland in 1799;
was present at the taking of Alexandria, and com-
manded the first Battalion of the Coldstream Guards
in Egypt in 1801, for his services in Egypt he re-
ceived the silver war medal with one clasp. The Earl
of Cork entered the army as Ensign on the 13th
April, 1785, and was appointed General on the 27th
May, 1825.

On Monday morning, the body of James Galvin,
private of the 9th Dep't, who was drowned last week
in the river, near this city, was found by Mr. Thomas
Peacocks, of Broad-street, while bathing. He was
only 19 years of age, and volunteered from the Kerry
Militia. Dr. Murphy, Coroner, held an inquest on
the body yesterday, when a verdict of accidental
death was returned. Mr. T. Peacocks was examined
at the inquest, and deposed that as he was out bath-
ing he saw the body of the soldier lying at the bottom
of the Abbey river. He dived for him, and, after
much exertion, succeeded in bringing the body to the
surface of the water, and getting it into a sand cot,
after having it properly washed.

On Sunday night the steam transport "Queen of
the South," Captain Beale, arrived in Queenstown
from Southampton, with a detachment of eighty men

Cahir. The vessel left next evening for Dublin, with
