

The fair of Mallow held on Monday was fully double as large as the corresponding fairs on former years. Buyers were in attendance at an early hour, and a flock of every description crowded the fair green. Afulness was apprehended in the prices of black cattle, but the large sales effected proved that the sellers were fairly remunerated; we understand that the number of horned cattle sold, amounted to nearly 1000—fat cattle and stores were in demand, and brought high prices. Two years old ranged from 7l. to 10l. yearlings from 4l. to 6l. The large square appropriated for the sale of sheep, and lambs was completely thronged, and the numbers sold amounted to close on 8000—the horse fair was well supplied, and some first class horses were exhibited, and long prices refused several two and three years old, colts of a good description charged owners. Fat pigs sold at about 50s. per cwt. The improvements both in quality and quantity of stock, exhibited at this fair was the subject of general remark, and all were in excellent condition.

The winners at Heath races on Tuesday were Mr. Dunne's Dairy Maid, Mr. Bryan's astronomer, Mr. O'Donough's Newton-le-Willows, the Marquis of Waterford's Cheerful, Mr. Wydnse's North Leach, Mr. Irwin's Dunmerry, Mr. Wynnee's Cusbawn.

Rev. Mr. M'Clean, rector of Tynan, on a visit to the Bishop, is to preach at the Cathedral to-morrow afternoon.

The Lord Bishop of Killaloe will hold a confirmation at Gort church on Tuesday, the 12th July, and on the 14th, he will consecrate the new church of Kilcolgan, of which the Very Rev. the Provost of Kilmacduagh is the rector.

The Rev. Robert Francis Russell has been inducted to the rectory and vicarage of Killenlough.

A new church has been built at Brosna, co. Kerry—the first stone of which was laid by Maurice F. Sandes, Esq. Oak Park. The Rev. Mr. Norman preached in English and the Rev. Mr. Moriarty in Irish on the occasion.

The memorial of the meeting convened in Gort to express their disapproval of the breaking of the windows of the Protestant Church, and to request the removal of the Protestant portion of the police from that town, was not signed by any of the magistrates, or respectables of that locality. We are told that even some of the Roman Catholic priests refused to sign it because it condemned most unjustly the impartial and efficient conduct of the constabulary stationed in that town and district.

The Dean of Kilmacduagh has written to the Rev. R. C. Dallas, secretary to the Irish Church mission society, stating, that the Scripture Readers stationed in Gort have been accused of breaking the church windows, and calling upon that society to vindicate the character of their agents, and to assist in the discovery of the perpetrators of that sacrilegious outrage.

The Rev. G. A. Heather, curate of the parishes of Ardahan and Craughwell, has resigned the charge of the Irish Church mission at Gort, the duties of which will in future be performed by the Rev. Messrs. Brownrigg and Brock.

A mission in honour of the Feast of St. Alphonsus was opened this morning, at the Redemptorists' Chapel, Upper Henry-street. During the Octave, masses will be said at five o'clock in the morning. The Clergymen will remain in the confessional during the entire of the day, and a sermon will be given each evening.
