It is desirable to retain as many medallists as possible, and his Royal Highness trusts to the services of commanding officers in this respect.

CITY OF LIMERICK GAOL.

Observations made by Corry Connellan, Esq. General of Prisons, on his late visit to the City of Limerick Gaol, as published by him for the consideration of the Legislature, &c.:—“Having felt it my duty to hold a special inquiry into the condition and discipline of this prison, in consequence of the irregularities having come to my knowledge, I directed the Board of Superintendence to meet in conference; and I am bound to state that I received every courtesy at their hands, and returned to them an assurance that they would take every precaution, as far as might be practicable, for supplying the defects, and for correcting the abuses brought under their particular consideration, on my first visit; this undertaking I found on my second visit to have been fulfilled in many particulars; and I now have to briefly recapitulate the prominent evils, which formed the subject of my investigation:—1st. The deficiency of bedding, but especially of the latter. 2nd. The incompetency of the gaol officers, no consideration being given to their fitness; their salaries being insufficient for securing the services of qualified persons, and their being no bye-laws for their guidance in the allocation of their several duties, and their respective responsibilities. 3rd. The very lax state of discipline prevailing throughout, as evidenced in a number of instances, all tending to show that the Governor, who has served for a very long period, has latterly become affected with deafness, and being in that energy and vigilance which are indispensable to the due enforcement of subordination, as well among officers as those over whom they are employed. I select a few of these instances.

The gate-porter's book, a most important check, had been imperfectly kept as to present no reliable account of the in-comings and out-goings of all the prisoners, both extern and intern, and to furnish no reliable means for the admission of visitors, who had hitherto been allowed to pass the gate without any communication being made to the governor, and without search. This neglect transpired from an unhappy casualty taken place in the marshalsea, namely, the escape of a debtor named Nanan, which was alleged to have been caused by a kick, inflicted during a scuffle, which was found by a coroner's jury, at an inquest subsequently, to have been the result of inflammation, produced from strangulated hernia. At the same time, Mrs. Nanan, the wife of the deceased, and another person, a male, were admitted into the prison without question and without search (on this as on other occasions,) after the hours for locking the prison doors, by a temporary turnkey, who was entrusted with the

LIMERICK HARBOUR BOARD.—A meeting of the Harbour Commissioners was held this evening. A letter was read from Mr. Joseph Murphy, Town Clerk, calling attention to the present unprotected and dangerous state of the Quays, and suggesting the necessity of providing chains, posts and life buoys; it was agreed to refer the letter to the Board of Works. The attention of the United General Gas Company is to be called to a complaint, that one of the lamps on Russell's Quay was not lit on the night of the melancholy drowning of Mr. Barry.—At the suggestion of Mr. Ryan it was resolved to acquaint the Corporation, with an allegation that there was a deficiency in the lighting of Arthur's Quay, on Sunday night, when Mr. Molloy was drowned.
