APPLICATION OF TIDAL POWER.—At the
 Academie des Sciences, a descrip-
 tion of the Abbe Giovanna
 showing the force of tidal streams to
 means of what he terms a hy-
 draulic which consists of a series of wooden
 angular bases united together, so
 as to form a less articulated band or chain, in-
 stead of the surface of the water, and to give
 rise to the currents. The bases of the pyra-
 mids are placed vertically, in such a manner as to be

 is derived. The inventor proposed
 to apply his system to tugging-boats and
 and with this view made several
 experiments, which were stated to have
 produced good results. However, M. Morrin, who
 was at the Academie to examine the model
 which was at work on the Seine, near
 Paris, and report upon it, was of opinion
 that the latter applied to furnish motive power
 more than to traffic purposes, which,
 would necessitate the employment
 of machinery that would encumber navigable
 rivers. He thought the invention, on account of
 its cheapness, susceptible of useful ap-
 plication. He estimated the resulting force
 to be at twenty-two per cent. of the
 power, and also that it might be advan-
 taged to communicate motion to dredging
 machines.

 excessive speculative habits of the board
 and from the Directors having drawn
 out the question and without control.
 They have advanced large sums of money
 to railway companies—not one sixpence
