### DEATH OF THE DOWAGER LADY O'BRIEN.

With regret we announce the death of one of the most excellent and amiable ladies in Ireland—the Dowager Lady O'Brien, relict of the late Sir Edward O'Brien, Bart. M.P. This melancholy event took place at Dromoland Castle, at 11 o'clock this morning, and was occasioned by injuries received by a fall down stairs, a few day's ago. In Lady O'Brien were combined all the graces and accomplishments, as well as virtues that could adorn her sex. She was an attached wife, an affectionate parent, and a sincere and warm-hearted friend.—Her charities were unlimited—the widow or orphan never applied to her in vain—the voice of misery ever awoke an echo, and found a response in her bosom. Her hand and her heart were always open to relieve the wants of the indigent and necessitous. Her thoughtful and provident mind did not content itself with an alleviation of merely physical sufferings; the moral as well as material welfare of the people were alike objects of her care and attention. She devoted a large portion of her property for the instruction and education of the children of her tenantry. In a word, she spent her whole life doing good, and she has departed rejoicing in the God of her salvation. Her death bed was surrounded by her fond and loving children. By Lady O'Brien's demise vast estates in the counties of Limerick and Clare will devolve on her eldest son, Lord Inchiquin, Lord Lieutenant of the county Clare, and her second son, William Smith O'Brien, Esq. of Cahermoyle, in this county.
