

ated that the bills of indictment should be laid before them, and the jury having returned into Court were discharged at three o'clock.

Mr. James R. Browne, late proprietor of the *Examiner* newspaper, entered a number of processes against the Limerick Market Trustees, and other public bodies and private individuals in Limerick, for money due for advertisements and for subscriptions; but the cases were dismissed on merits, as the plaintiff would not be satisfied with an order for every advertisement for which a vouchier could be produced.

Mr. S. Bouchier, on behalf of Mr. W. Sheehy, applied to have the costs of Mr. Murphy, town clerk, for preparing the burgess roll, taxed by his worship. This matter gave rise to considerable argument, in which Mr. Sheehy, having accused Mr. Cullen of stating what he knew to be false, was called to order and reprimanded by his worship for the impropriety of his language, his worship remarking that no one in Limerick believed Mr. Cullen was capable of stating a falsehood. His worship ruled that Mr. Murphy's account should be certified for the present, and directed Mr. Sheehy, if the question was raised again, to furnish returns of the rate of remuneration paid for the performance of similar duties in other towns.

A process at the suit of Mr. Wallis against Mr. Bernal for the value of goods sold at an auction, was dismissed.

INSOLVENT DEBTORS,

The Knight of Glin was opposed by 36 creditors; his debts amount to £3,500. Petition dismissed and remanded to gaol.

Henry Steyens—it was stated his wife lately received a legacy of £700 which the insolvent alleged he had no control over—Sentenced to 18 months imprisonment.

Timothy Foley—to be imprisoned for 18 months.

Michael Mulcahy, baker of Charlott's quay, opposed by Mr. Going, miller—sentenced to 18 months.

John Fitzgibbon, opposed by John M'Kenstry, of Londonderry, for support of two illegitimate children. The insolvent craved the lenity of the Court on the ground of his bad state of health—to be imprisoned 18 months from the 9th December, 1855.

Jacob Smith, a deficient letter carrier—to be imprisoned one month.

The petitions of Patrick Carroll, Joseph Keays and Patrick O'Grady, adjourned.

COUNTY QUARTER SESSIONS.—YESTERDAY.

At 9 o'clock the Assistant-Barrister Tighe, took his seat on the Bench, in the Criminal Court, accompanied by Alderman Watson.

The first prisoner put forward was Ellen Murphy, charged with having burglariously entered a dwelling house, at Tullabeg, in August last, and having stolen the articles thereout. On being placed at the Bar, the prisoner suddenly dropped down in a fit, and his Worship ordered her removal.

The long panel having been called, several parties not in attendance, were fined 40s.

Michael Murphy charged with assaulting Cornelius Ryan was discharged, the prosecutor, John Casey not appearing, when called, the Barrister ruled that his recognizances should be estreated, and the prisoner discharged.

Elly Ryan was convicted of having stolen 5 lambs, near Emly, the property of Daniel Birrane, and sentenced to 12 months imprisonment.

CITY GRAND JURY.

The following were sworn on the City Grand Jury—Bryan Hanrahan, foreman; John C. Hanrahan, William Herbert, Thomas Kearse, Joseph Bodkin Kennedy, Joseph Lynch, Thomas Myles, Edward Mulcahy, William O'Connell, Richard Sidley, Robert Unthank, and Francis John Walker, Esqrs.

His Worship briefly addressed the Jury on the state of the calendar, which, he said, was rather of a heavy nature, and that, notwithstanding its heaviness it would be still more weighty, were it not for the

Not so, however, the fourth, for while getting on to the window-sill, he lost his balance and fell with much violence to the ground, a depth of about 25 feet. Some of the officers having been aroused from their slumbers, had the boy removed to the infirmary, where he at present lies. The injuries he received, though not of a fatal character, are serious; his frame has been much shaken by the fall.

FUNERAL OF THE LATE JOHN RUSSELL, Esq J.P.—

Yesterday morning the remains of the above lamented gentleman, whose death we recorded in last *CHRONICLE*, were removed for interment from his late residence, Edwardstown, in this County, to Cahirnarry church yard, and deposited in the new family vault erecting in that cemetery. The funeral cortege was respectable and numerous, comprising the surviving relatives and friends of deceased, the mercantile and trading interests of the City, private equippages of the gentry of City and County, the tenantry and hundreds of workmen and labourers with scarfs and hat bands. The body was placed in a cedar shell, upholstered with white satin; outside the shell was a lead coffin and both were encased in a solid oak sarcophagus, richly mounted with brass plate on lid upon which the age and name of deceased were engraved. there were twenty chief mourners in the cortege, with silk scarfs and bands; 100 other mourners in crape and a long line of tenantry, workmen labourers, &c. with scarfs and bands. Amongst the private carriages that followed were those of Messrs. John Croker, Ballynegarde, R. W. Brereton, J. Bannatyne, Roger, Major Gavin; Messrs. Cantillon, Shine, Vincent, Russells, Spaight, Dr. Gelston, O'Hara, O'Callaghan, Quin, Quinlivan, M'Donnell, Matthews, Oake, Ryan, Shaw, Evans, Carroll, M'Murray, O'Shea, &c. The funeral service was read by Rev. Mr. Seymour, assisted by Rev. Mr. Gubbins. The Medical Gentlemen were Dr. Bennett, (Bruff), and Dr. Gelston. The funeral was supplied and conducted by Mr. William Owens, of No. 4, Mallow-street, in creditable style, and afforded general satisfaction.
