

progress of this fine building with which we are truly gratified, and we have been forcibly struck only with the style and beauty of the building, but also with the superior excellence and finish of the workmanship, particularly the cut of the stone which can nowhere be excelled. As an edifice when finished, this building will place in nearly every other public building in any other provincial town in Ireland, and it will at once gratify all those who know and appreciate architectural beauty, and the workmanship. It is to be regretted that the conspicuous site could not have been secured by the Committee than Pery-street; for a building as this ought, if it were practicable, to stand where it would be ever before the eye, but this we understand was not to be. The Committee were therefore obliged to the present site as being suitable to their mind the convenience of those who may have meetings within its walls, the hall for 100 feet by 44 in the clear, with an elevation to ceiling of about 50 feet, will be the equal of any in the South of Ireland, and some individuals complained of the plainness of the building, and that one of a plainer and more costly description would have attained the object desired by its erection. When it is known that a very large proportion of the money being laid out, was contributed by the liberality and benevolence of a few philanthropic gentlemen amongst the orphans' most anxious friends, and how little in comparison has been contributed by the general public, there is in truth no ground for such complaint, in proof of which the names who joined in that complaint, subsequently gave in their donations, and a good many of them actually doubled their previous contributions, and now that our city is full of the nobility and gentry of this County and surrounding counties, many of whom have not yet contributed anything towards the building. There is no doubt that they will readily avail themselves of the opportunity of lodging their donations in the Bank to the credit of the Treasurer, Mr. Franklin, Esq. in aid of a building which will reflect credit on the individuals and families of donors by whose aid and exertions it is founded in furtherance of the interests of the Protestant Orphan Society and religion in
