THE Principal Officers of Her Majesty's War Department hereby give Notice that they will receive Proposals from such persons as are desirous of entering into a Contract from the 28th NOVEMBER, 1856 to 31st MARCH, 1862—

For Pumping Water for the use of the Troops, &c., and for keeping in Repair and Preservation the Government Water Works at the Temporary Barracks, Curragh of Kildare, in the Curragh District.

The person declared the Contractor will have the free use of the existing Water Works for the purposes of this Contract.

The Tender to be in a lump sum at per Annum, paid for Quarterly, and the Contract to be determinable at the end of any Quarter after the 31st March, 1858, on either party giving the other Three Months notice in writing, after that date, or determinable by the War Department at any period, and at a moment's notice, should the Contractor fail in affording the necessary supply of Water, or be dissatisfied with the manner in which the service is performed by the Contractor.
