An affray attended with fatal consequences took

place last week between two men named Skehan and M'Mahon, (cousins), who were working on the lands of Marble-hill, near this city. The row originated in some trifling quarrel about tobacco, when in the heat of their anger Skehan struck M'Mahon on the head with a spade inflicting a severe compound fracture of the scull. The unfortunate man was removed to Barrington's hospital, where every attention was paid him. He remained completely insensible for nearly two days, when at length it was deemed advisable to perform an operation for the removal of the bone which was embedded in the skull, and the instant it was removed perfect consciousness returned, and he was able to relate every particular connected with the occurrence. However, the wound was of so serious a character that he sunk under its effects and died on Sunday morning. An inquest was held on Monday by the Coroner, when the following verdict was returned: 'We find that John Skehan is guilty of manslaughter.'

Mr. Richard O'Connell has given the following notice of motion at the Trales dispensary committee :--"That this committee is of opinion that the tickets issued by any member ought not be cancelled unless it be quite certein that the party in whose behalf the ticket has been issued has (if single) a fixed certain income exceeding £40 a year, or if married, and having a family, then a fixed certain income of £52 a year, as this committee thinks that all persons, whose entire incomes are under the respective amounts above specified, are proper objects of dispensary relief, as such incomes, at present prices, barely admit parties to procure the necessaries of subsistence independent of medical relief during illness." "That this committee are of opinion that there are many persons who, though they may be able to purchase medicines, are not able to afford to pay for medical and surgical advice; that we, therefore, recommend the Poor Law Commissioners to allow members of dispensary committee to issue tickets in a new form, entitling such parties to the advice of the medical officers of such dispensary, either at the patient's home or at the dispensary, as circumstances may require, but not to issue to such patients any medicine whatever, a practice which was very prevalent under the old dispensary system.
