In conclusion, the council recommend the members to exert their influence with their brethren to join the society, and, by increasing its strength, to support the best interests of the profession, both in town and country ; and with a view to attain this end, it is suggested that we should imitate the example of our brethren in England by calling on the members to induce some of their partners and professional friends as have not yet joined the society, no longer to withhold their support from it.

MURDER OF A WIFE BY HER HUSBAND.

This morning a very painful sensation was excited through the city, by the rumour that a woman had been savagely murdered by her husband on last night, and, on enquiry, we find that the statement is unfortunately too true. It appears that the deceased and her husband, Thomas Donohue, a chainmaker by trade, residing in the Abbey, near Peter's Cell, did not live on the best terms with each other of late, the wife being given to understand that he had formed an acquaintance with another female, which gave rise to family quarrels between them. The deceased was about fifteen or sixteen years' older than the husband. Yesterday morning she was confined, and about four hours after her confinement she got up, and went to the house of a neighbour, where she complained of ill-treatment from her husband. The neighbour put her into bed, but the husband came soon after and obliged her to return to her own house, and go about some domestic business, which, it appeared from her weakly state, she was unable to do. Fresh altercations arose, and late in the evening Donohue took off a heavy iron-heeled boot—such as that worn by stevedores or dock labourers—and inflicted two violent blows on the head which knocked her down, causing severe compound fracture of the skull and copious bleeding. She died from the effects of the injuries almost immediately, and her mangled and still-bleeding corpse on the floor of the house presented a ghastly and dreadful spectacle. Immediately, on hearing of the horrible deed, Constable Nash hastened to the spot and made a prisoner of the husband, after which he proceeded to examine into and elicit all the facts connected with the murder that could be elicited. He then brought the prisoner before Alderman Watson this morning, at the sitting of the court, who directed that the Coroner should be apprised of the occurrence, and that the body should not be removed from where it lay, in charge of the police, until the Coroner and jury had viewed it. Donohue is a stout, powerful man, apparently about thirty-two years of age at most ; but of very dark and sullen-looking features. He made no remark whatever, and was lodged in jail awaiting the inquest.
